Similarly, we organized Emergency Coordination Meetings for the Bihar floods to address immediate needs and develop robust response strategies. Additionally, five coordination meetings were held in Wayanad to streamline efforts in the wake of recent landslides, further strengthening the local response. On the learning and capacity-building front, the Sphere India Academy remained active with impactful sessions. In partnership with IOM, we facilitated a session on Data Protection and Management for the



Collecting disability disaggregated data in disaster risk reduction: Findings and lessons learned This report syntheses findings from the collection and analysis of disability disaggregated collected through the Washington Group Short Set of Questions (WG-SS) in seven different countries (Bangladesh, Indonesia, Colombia, Myanmar, Niger, Uganda, and Nicaragua). The analysis shows significant variations in the prevalence of persons with disabilities with the lowest prevalence of 4.2% in Niger, and the highest, a notable 29%, in Myanmar. 
