

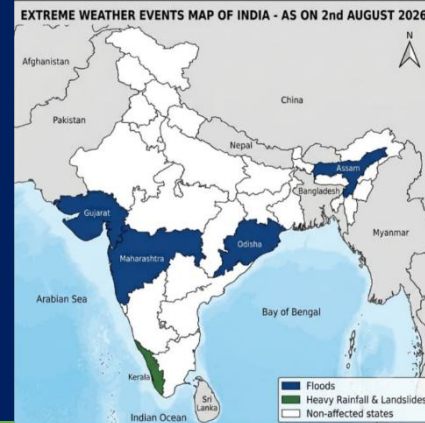

# Extreme Weather Events in India

Assam, Odisha, Gujarat, Kerala and Maharashtra

Date: 2<sup>nd</sup> August 2026



## SITUATION UPDATE

### A. Situation Overview :

India is facing multi-state monsoon emergencies across Assam, Odisha, Gujarat, Maharashtra and Kerala, with Assam and Odisha the worst-affected due to severe flooding, large-scale displacement, and extensive crop and livestock losses.

### 1. Assam Flood - Severe Flooding Across 5 Districts

#### Impact on Humans

Heavy monsoon rains and rising river levels have caused widespread flooding across Assam, affecting **7 districts, 20 revenue circles, and 349 villages**. As per ASDMA's DRIMS report, **1,78,837 people** have been impacted, and **15,060 hectares** of crop area remain submerged. Floodwaters from the **Dikhou (Sivasagar)** and **Dhansiri (South)**, **Numaligarh** have inundated major population clusters in Golaghat, Sivasagar, Charaideo, Bajali, Dhemaji, Sonitpur and Jorhat. The affected population comprises **75,388 males, 76,104 females, and 27,345 children**, with the highest caseloads in **Charaideo (75,199), Sivasagar (58,824), Jorhat (28,846)** and **Golaghat (14,545)**. **No human deaths or missing persons** have been reported as of 1 August 2026.

#### Animal Husbandry Loss

Flooding has significantly impacted livestock-dependent households. A total of **6,765 animals** are affected, including **2,795 big, 2,587 small, and 1,383 poultry**. Additionally, **1,543 animals** have been washed away—primarily **1,500 poultry** from Sivasagar—posing serious livelihood risks for farming and pastoral communities already facing crop losses.

#### Structural and Property Damages

Floodwaters have damaged homes and essential structures across multiple districts. A total of **267 houses** are fully/severely damaged (including **228 kuccha** and **39 pucca**), while **1,092 houses** are partially damaged (**645 kuccha, 447 pucca**). Damage to **347 other structures**, including **171 huts** and **126 cattle sheds** in Sivasagar and **50 huts** in Charaideo, highlights extensive loss of shelter and livestock infrastructure.

#### Irrigation and Water Supply

Flooding has submerged **15,060 hectares** of agricultural land, with major losses in **Charaideo (8,300 ha), Sivasagar (5,011 ha), Golaghat (1,346 ha)** and **Jorhat (325 ha)**. Stagnant floodwaters and damaged water sources have increased risks of contamination and waterborne diseases, as noted in national coordination discussions.

#### Electricity and Power Supply

Flood-affected pockets, especially low-lying rural areas, are experiencing intermittent disruptions in electricity and communication networks. While DRIMS does not provide quantitative outage data, field inputs indicate that power fluctuations are affecting relief camp operations, health facilities, and water supply systems, increasing overall vulnerability.

### 2. Odhisa – Floods 2026

#### Impact on Humans

Odisha continues to face widespread flooding triggered by a deep depression over the Bay of Bengal, affecting **5.93 lakh+ people across 18 districts**. Heavy rainfall, river surges, and multiple embankment breaches have displaced thousands, with **2,67,301 lakh people evacuated** to safer locations as on 31<sup>st</sup> July. Balasore, Bhadrak, Jajpur, Kendujhar, and Mayurbhanj remain the worst-hit. Media reports highlight stranded families in Balasore and Bhadrak still awaiting food and water support.

#### Animal Husbandry Loss

Livestock losses have been reported mainly from Balasore and Kendujhar, where rapid flash floods submerged cattle sheds and grazing fields. Balasore recorded **9 livestock casualties**, while Kendujhar reported **3 deaths**. Thousands of animals remain stranded, requiring fodder and veterinary support.

#### Structural and Property Damages

Floodwaters have caused extensive damage to homes and critical infrastructure. Over **1,426 houses collapsed** statewide, with Bhadrak alone reporting **1,426 fully damaged houses** (788 in Bhandaripokhari, 638 in Dhamnagar). Balasore reported **654 damaged houses**, while Kendujhar and Mayurbhanj recorded **216** and **269** damaged houses respectively.

#### Road and Transport Infrastructure

Multiple road networks have been disrupted due to breaches, waterlogging, and erosion. A major bridge collapse at Tikilia village (Bhadrak) has cut off access to Solampur GP. Kendujhar reported a **20-m embankment breach** near Anandapur Ring Road Bridge. Jajpur faced embankment failures along the Kani and Brahmani rivers, affecting mobility and emergency response.

#### Irrigation and Water Supply

Flooding has submerged **16,187 hectares of crop land**, damaging irrigation channels and inundating tube wells. Jajpur alone reported **11,497 hectares** affected. Waterlogging has contaminated drinking water sources in Balasore and Bhadrak, prompting emergency distribution of purification tablets.

#### Electricity and Power Supply

Power outages have been reported in low-lying pockets of Balasore, Bhadrak, and Kendujhar due to submerged transformers and snapped lines. Restoration teams are active but access challenges persist.

### 3. Maharashtra - Heavy Rainfall Leading to Flooding

Continuous heavy rainfall across Maharashtra has triggered flooding in multiple districts, particularly Nagpur, Palghar, Pune, and parts of the Konkan belt. Rural, tribal, and low-income communities have suffered the greatest impact, with widespread damage to homes, displacement of families, and severe disruption of livelihoods. Relief efforts by district administrations, NGOs, and community groups are ongoing, but needs continue to exceed available resources—especially for food, shelter, and animal welfare.

#### Impact on Humans

Flooding has affected thousands of families across Nagpur, Palghar, Pune, and Lonavala regions. Tribal hamlets, Katkari communities, and low-income households have faced severe losses of shelter, food stocks, and essential belongings. Landslides in Maval and Mulshi have worsened displacement. Social media reports show stranded families requesting food and tarpaulin support.

#### Animal Husbandry Loss

Floodwaters have severely impacted animal shelters in Nagpur, especially two dog shelters in Hingna and Hajaripahad. Animals require urgent food, medicines, and shelter repairs. Rural livestock in Palghar and Pune also face fodder shortages and shelter damage.

#### Structural and Property Damages

Homes in tribal and rural belts have suffered extensive damage, especially kutchha structures. Landslides in Maval and Mulshi have destroyed houses and belongings. Katkari hamlets report urgent need for tarpaulins to rebuild temporary shelters.

#### Road and Transport Infrastructure

Landslides and waterlogging have disrupted connectivity in Maval, Mulshi, and parts of Nagpur. Rural roads remain inaccessible, affecting relief distribution. Media reports indicate blocked routes in Palghar due to overflowing streams.

#### Irrigation and Water Supply

Flooding has contaminated water sources in tribal belts, forcing communities to rely on emergency water distribution. Agricultural fields in Palghar and Pune have experienced waterlogging, affecting crop cycles.

#### Electricity and Power Supply

Power outages have been reported in parts of Nagpur and Palghar due to submerged transformers and snapped lines. Restoration is ongoing but hamlets remain vulnerable.

### 4. Gujarat - Heavy Rainfall Leading to Flooding

Heavy rainfall across south, central, and urban Gujarat has triggered severe flooding, affecting **27,856 people** who have been relocated from multiple districts including Surat, Navsari, Bharuch, Tapi, Morbi, Surendranagar, Chhota Udepur, and Vadodara. Urban flooding has emerged in **Ahmedabad and Gandhinagar**, where underserved pockets lack basic amenities. With **Morbi receiving 220 mm rainfall in 12 hours** and **Surendranagar recording 176 mm**, the situation remains critical. IMD forecasts **fresh heavy rainfall from 1 August**, increasing the risk of further flooding.

#### Impact on Humans

Flooding has displaced **27,856 people**, including **11,500 in Navsari**, **11,176 in Surat**, **240+ in Abrama, Velanja, Amroli, Umra, Kathor**, **49 in Chhota Udepur**, and **79 in Vadodara**. Rural pockets such as Olpad and Mangrol were inundated due to the Kim River overflow, while urban flooding in **Ahmedabad and Gandhinagar** has affected slum clusters and low-income households.

#### Animal Husbandry Loss

Livestock has been impacted across rural belts, with NDRF rescuing **2 animals** during operations in Bilimora (Navsari). Waterlogging in farmlands has increased livestock vulnerability, especially in Bharuch, Navsari, and Tapi. Crop loss has also been reported due to prolonged waterlogging.

#### Structural and Property Damages

Floodwaters caused major infrastructure damage, including the collapse of a **40-metre stretch** of the Tapi riverside road in Surat, with **100 metres barricaded** and **250–300 vehicles diverted**. Homes in low-lying rural and urban pockets were inundated, especially in Olpad, Mangrol, and Ahmedabad slums.

#### Road and Transport Infrastructure

Transport networks were severely disrupted due to extreme rainfall. **Morbi recorded 220 mm in 12 hours**, the highest in the state, while **Surendranagar recorded 176 mm** in Dhrangadhra. Waterlogging and road damage led to major traffic diversions in Surat and restricted movement in rural talukas.

#### Irrigation and Water Supply

Overflowing rivers and dams have inundated agricultural fields and contaminated water sources. The **Kim River overflow** caused flooding in Olpad and Mangrol, while multiple dams reported overflow, affecting irrigation channels. Waterlogging in farmlands was also reported.

#### Electricity and Power Supply

Localized power outages occurred in rural and semi-urban belts. Relief centres such as Velanja Primary School arranged temporary electricity for evacuees. Urban slum pockets in Ahmedabad also reported outages due to waterlogging.vulnerable.

### 5. Kerala - Heavy Rainfall & Landslides

Kerala is experiencing severe monsoon conditions marked by intense rainfall, flash floods, and multiple landslides across high-range districts. As of 2 August 2026, at least **7–8 fatalities** have been reported across Kottayam, Idukki, Pathanamthitta, Malappuram and Wayanad, with widespread damage to homes, roads, and essential services. The IMD has issued **orange alerts** for most districts, and authorities have opened **65 relief camps** to support affected communities.

#### Impact on Humans

Heavy rainfall triggered landslides and flash floods, resulting in **7–8 deaths**, including four killed in landslides and three children who drowned in rain-related incidents. Fatalities occurred in **Kottayam, Idukki, Pathanamthitta, Malappuram and Wayanad**, with additional cases of electrocution and fishermen missing at sea. Communities in **Ranni, Vadaserikkara, Pala, Erattupetta, Kanjirappally** and other low-lying areas remain severely affected.

#### Animal Husbandry Loss

The severe flooding in rural belts of Pathanamthitta, Idukki and Kottayam suggests likely impacts on smallholder livestock, poultry sheds, and grazing areas. This remains an emerging assessment need.

#### Structural and Property Damages

Landslides have destroyed multiple homes, particularly in **Kottayam (Payyani Estate), Idukki (Adoor Mala)** and **Vagamon (Kolahalamedu)**. Commercial and residential areas in **Erattupetta, Koottickal, Erumeli, Pala** and parts of Pathanamthitta have been inundated. A police jeep was damaged in a landslide at **Upputhara**.

#### Road and Transport Infrastructure

Heavy rainfall and landslides have severely disrupted mobility across key corridors in Kerala. Multiple highways and arterial routes remain blocked or waterlogged, slowing rescue deployment and restricting movement of essential supplies. The worst-affected stretches include the Kochi–Dhanushkodi NH near Chackochi Bend, NH-183 at Vandiperiyar, and the Kottarakara–Dindigul and Kuttikanam–Kattapana routes, all of which are experiencing landslide debris or rising water levels.

#### Irrigation and Water Supply

Extreme rainfall (up to **314 mm in Vagamon, 302 mm in Vadaserikkara, 260 mm in Laha**) has caused river swelling and waterlogging, contaminating local water sources. Floodwaters have entered Jal Jeevan Mission sites, posing risks to drinking water safety.

#### Electricity and Power Supply

Localized outages have been reported, especially in **Wayanad**, where a farmer was electrocuted while managing water near a pump. Landslides and flooding likely caused intermittent disruptions to electricity and communication networks across affected districts.

## Government Response

Across India, state governments, NDRF, SDRF, Fire Services, district administrations, and local authorities are conducting extensive search, rescue, and relief operations in response to severe flooding in **Assam, Odisha, Gujarat, and Maharashtra**. More than **27,856 people have been evacuated in Gujarat, 2.67 lakh in Odisha**, and thousands more across Assam and Maharashtra. Urban flooding in **Ahmedabad, Gandhinagar, and Nagpur** has required additional deployment of emergency teams. Veterinary services, medical teams, and district-level coordination mechanisms have been activated to address livestock distress, water contamination, and access constraints. IMD alerts for continued heavy rainfall have prompted states to intensify preparedness and response measures.

### 1. Search & Rescue Operations

Government search and rescue efforts have intensified across all affected states, with teams working around the clock to evacuate stranded families, clear access routes, and respond to rapidly rising water levels.

#### Assam:

- Civil Defence volunteers mobilized for last-mile delivery where vehicle access is blocked.
- Travel advisory issued for responders to use **Dibrugarh route** instead of Jorhat due to severe congestion.
- Multiple districts (Sivasagar, Jorhat, Charaideo) under continuous monitoring for rising water levels.

#### Odisha:

- **2.67 lakh people evacuated to 476 relief camps** across 18 districts.
- Rapid evacuation triggered by embankment breaches in **Kani River (Jajpur)** and **Brahmani River**.
- District administrations in Balasore, Bhadrak, Jajpur, Kendujhar, and Mayurbhanj conducting continuous rescue operations.

#### Gujarat:

- **17 NDRF teams, 33 SDRF teams, and 6 Army columns** deployed (2 each in Ahmedabad, Surat, Navsari).
- **27,856 people evacuated** across Surat, Navsari, Bharuch, Tapi, Morbi, Surendranagar, Chhota Udepur, and Vadodara.
- **114 people rescued** in Bilimora (Navsari) by NDRF.
- Rural evacuations: **240+ people** in Abrama, Velanja, Amroli, Umra, Kathor; **49 in Chhota Udepur; 79 in Vadodara**.

#### Maharashtra:

- District administrations monitoring flood-affected areas in **Nagpur, Palghar, Pune, and Lonavala**.
- Landslide-affected hamlets in **Maval & Mulshi** under active evacuation support.
- Emergency movement of families from tribal Katkari hamlets due to shelter collapse and landslide risk.

### 2. Flood Assistance & Relief Work

#### Assam

- Relief operations supporting **3,000 families** through cleaning drives, food distribution, and essential supplies.
- ADRA India conducting coordinated assessments targeting **283 households** in Charaideo and Sivasagar.
- Government veterinary teams running daily camps, reaching **5,000 animals** and targeting **10,000**, addressing fodder shortages and carcass disposal.
- Public health measures initiated due to water contamination and stagnant water in multiple districts.
- District administrations coordinating with CRS and TDH for shelter, WASH, hygiene kits, and child protection support.

#### Odisha

- State government operating **476 relief camps** sheltering **1.76 lakh evacuees** across 18 districts.
- **234 free kitchens** in Bhadrak and **138 relief camps** in Balasore providing cooked meals and drinking water.
- Deployment of **14 medical teams** and **5 veterinary teams** in Bhadrak for health, snakebite management, and livestock care.
- Distribution of tarpaulins, polythene rolls, halogen tablets, bleaching powder, and mineral water across affected districts.
- Support for farmers after **16,187 hectares** of crop loss, including early recovery planning and agricultural assistance.

#### Gujarat

- Relief centres operational in Surat, Navsari, Vadodara providing food, water, electricity, and medical support to **27,856 displaced people**.
- Electricity restored at Velanja Primary School to support evacuees.
- Emergency supplies distributed in rural pockets affected by Kim River overflow (Olpad, Mangrol).
- Government addressing crop loss and waterlogging in farmlands across south and central Gujarat.
- Urban humanitarian gaps identified in **Ahmedabad & Gandhinagar**, prompting additional government monitoring and resource mobilization.
- IMD alerts for heavy rainfall from **1 August** have triggered heightened preparedness across districts.

#### Maharashtra

- Distribution of **196 dry ration kits** in Maval & Mulshi (Pune) through district coordination with NGOs.
- Government supporting temporary shelter restoration with **50 tarpaulin sheets** across 15 Katkari hamlets.
- Relief support initiated for **700–800 families** across **60 Gram Panchayats** in Palghar.
- Assistance provided to flood-affected animal shelters in Nagpur (Hingna & Hajaripahad), including food, medicines, and structural repairs.
- Additional ration support coordinated for **200 families** in Lonavala Katkariwadi.



## Humanitarian Response

Across Assam, Odisha, Maharashtra, Gujarat and other affected states, government agencies, humanitarian organisations, NGOs, community groups and Sphere India members are delivering coordinated multi-sector relief, including evacuation, food distribution, WASH support, temporary shelter, veterinary care and early recovery assistance. Sphere India continues to strengthen national–state coordination, resource mapping and gap identification through the URS Matrix in close collaboration with its members and IAG networks.

The national emergency coordination meeting, convened online by Sphere India's Inter-Agency Coordination Committee on 30 July 2026, brought together national NGOs, UN agencies, the Indian Red Cross Society, Inter-Agency Groups (IAGs), Sphere India members and state-level humanitarian partners to review the escalating flood situation across Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Gujarat, Maharashtra and Odisha. Participants agreed to strengthen multi-state coordination, accelerate field assessments and ensure real-time updates through the Unified Response Matrix (URS), with key decisions focused on improving access for relief teams, prioritising public health and WASH interventions, scaling veterinary support and mobilising additional partners for isolated districts. Agencies committed to updating the URS within 24 hours and enhancing district-level coordination, particularly in Assam.

### Key Action Points & Decisions

#### Immediate Actions

All responding agencies must update the **URS Matrix within 24 hours** and continue twice-weekly updates (Wednesday & Friday). Sphere India to facilitate **district-level IAG coordination meetings in Assam**. Field teams advised to follow **travel via Dibrugarh** due to severe congestion on Jorhat–Nazira routes.

#### State-Level Actions

**Assam:** Prioritise carcass disposal, public health measures, and improved district coordination.  
**Gujarat:** Prepare a rapid needs assessment for underserved urban pockets; monitor IMD alerts.  
**Arunachal Pradesh:** Mobilise additional partners and donors for isolated districts with blocked access.  
**Odisha & Maharashtra:** Continue assessments and prepare coordinated response plans as rainfall evolves.

#### Operational Priorities

Ensure **safe drinking water**, purification tablets and WASH kits.  
Distribute **shelter materials**, including tarpaulins and temporary structures.  
Scale **veterinary care and fodder supply** for affected livestock.  
Strengthen **child protection and psychosocial support** services.  
Deploy **health camps**, vector control measures and hygiene promotion.

## Immediate Emerging Needs

Across states, humanitarian needs are escalating due to continued rainfall, crop losses, displacement, and infrastructure damage. Priority areas include shelter, water, food, health, and livelihood recovery.

### Assam

- Large-scale shelter support for displaced families.
- Safe drinking water, hygiene kits, vector control ( Health Camps and awareness ).
- Food supplies and medical outreach.
- Livelihood assistance for farmers (16,000+ ha crop loss).
- Embankment repair, road restoration.

### Odisha

- Tarpaulins, ground sheets, blankets for temporary shelter.
- Water purification tablets, hygiene kits, baby food.
- Veterinary care and fodder for livestock.
- Road restoration and embankment repair.
- Agricultural input kits for affected farmers.

### Maharashtra

- Dry ration kits for **1,000+ families**.
- Shelter kits, tarpaulins (50 sheets urgently).
- Veterinary medicines, animal feed.
- Clothing, hygiene materials.
- Support for widows, elderly, PwDs, tribal households.
- Restoration of damaged animal shelters.

### Gujarat

- Safe shelters for evacuated families.
- Water purification tablets, drinking water, medical kits.
- Livestock fodder and veterinary support.
- Rapid needs assessment for underserved urban pockets

### Kerala

The situation in Kerala is **too early to assess**, and emerging needs are **awaited pending official updates and field information**.
