Flood Situation in Assam and Mizoram

Date: 16th July 2026



SITUATION UPDATE

A. Situation Overview : Assam Flood

Flood conditions persisted across Assam on 15 July 2026, affecting **six districts** — Lakhimpur, Sivasagar, Sonitpur, Dhemaji, Biswanath and Jorhat. A total of **96 villages** remain impacted, with floodwaters continuing to disrupt daily life, agriculture, and local infrastructure.

Impact on Humans

The flood has affected **35,072 people**, with Lakhimpur again reporting the highest burden. The DRIMS entry notes: “North Lakhimpur | Population Affected: 25560”. Biswanath district reported new impacts with **26 people** affected in Gohpur. No human deaths or missing persons were reported on this date. No relief camps were opened across any of the six affected districts, indicating no large-scale displacement. Instead, the administration relied entirely on **19 Relief Distribution Centres**, with **Lakhimpur operating the highest number (16 centres)**, followed by **Dhemaji (2)** and **Biswanath (1)**. These centres collectively supported **16,784 affected people**, ensuring food, essentials, and livestock feed reached communities without requiring camp-based shelter.

Animal Husbandry Loss

Livestock losses increased significantly, especially in Dhemaji and Lakhimpur. A total of **20,652 animals** were affected across districts, including **6,798 big animals** and **3,642 small animals** in Dhemaji alone. Lakhimpur reported **10,212 animals** affected. No animals were washed away on this date.

Structural and Property Damages

Damage to housing and community infrastructure remains moderate. **One fully damaged house** was reported in Dhemaji, while **72 houses** in Sivasagar suffered partial damage. Additional structural losses include an Anganwadi centre in Bihpuria, a fisheries pond in Teok, and a damaged PWSS pipeline in Sissiborgaon.

Structural and Property Damages

No houses were reported damaged on 15 July — fully or partially — across all districts. However, other community assets such as cattle sheds and huts also reported **zero damage**, indicating limited structural impact on this day.

Road and Transport Infrastructure

Road damage increased sharply, with **nine roads** affected across Bongaigaon, Dhemaji and Lakhimpur. Bongaigaon reported extensive damage across multiple PWD roads, including:

“Abhayapuri–Kabaitary Road... surface, side shoulder and hard crust damaged due to heavy rain.”

“SPT Bridge No. 1/1 over river Manas damaged... four spans bent due to heavy rain.”

In Lakhimpur, floodwaters submerged and damaged the **Borbari–Tulshijan road**, affecting connectivity over a **7.44 km stretch**.

Irrigation and Water Supply

No irrigation bund breaches or water supply failures were reported on 15 July. The situation remained stable compared to the previous day.

Electricity and Power Supply

No damage to electrical infrastructure was reported.

B. Situation Overview : Mizoram Floods & Landslides

Continuous heavy monsoon rainfall over the past several days has triggered **widespread flooding and multiple landslides** across Mizoram as of 13th July 2026 .The hilly terrain, saturated soil, and intense runoff have led to road blockages, damage to homes, and disruption of essential services. Several districts have reported **localized flash floods**, slope failures, and rising water levels in streams and rivulets.

Families Evacuated:

At least 80 families have been evacuated from Tlabung and nearby areas in Lunglei district following the overflow of the Khawthlangtuipui River. The affected families have been moved to safer locations across the district after flooding and landslides. They are currently accommodated with relatives, rented houses, housed in government facilities, or self-arranged in available public buildings.

Travellers Stranded:

Around 200 travellers stranded at Bualte village due to a massive landslide blocking NH-54.

Rainfall Statistics:

Serchhip recorded 34 mm rainfall, the highest in the state on the previous day. Khawzawl and Siaha also recorded heavy rainfall (exact figures not provided).

Landslide Incidents:

More than 29 landslide and rockfall locations reported across Mizoram. Major landslides blocked **NH-54** and the **Aizawl–Thenzawl–Lunglei highway**, cutting off southern districts.

Infrastructure Impact:

Multiple highways blocked repeatedly due to fresh mudslides. Farmlands submerged in Serchhip due to swollen Mat river.

Government Response

Assam Flood

Government agencies continued coordinated relief efforts across affected districts.

Relief Measures

A total of **19 relief distribution centres** were active. Relief supplies distributed included:

Rice: 495.25 quintals

Dal: 92.508 quintals

Salt: 27.76 quintals

Mustard oil: 2,762.52 litres

Cattle feed (rice bran): 338.69 quintals

Biswanath distributed tarpaulins, candles, and mosquito nets, while Lakhimpur provided **78.27 quintals of cattle feed concentrate**.

Rescue Operations

Two medical teams were deployed — one in Biswanath and one in Lakhimpur. No boat or helicopter evacuations were required on this date.



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Infrastructure Response

PWD and P&RD departments initiated immediate repairs in multiple locations. In Sissiborgaon, In Lakhimpur, emergency measures were taken to address breaches on the Asom Mala road at Futabhog.

Mizoram Flood & Landslide

The Government of Mizoram has activated **State and District Emergency Operation Centres (EOCs)**.

- **Search and rescue teams** from SDRF, Police, and Fire & Emergency Services deployed in Aizawl, Saitual, and Champhai.
- **Evacuation support** provided to families in high-risk slope zones.
- **Relief camps** opened in affected districts, providing temporary shelter, food, and medical care.
- **Road clearance operations** underway with excavators and earth-movers.
- **Rapid damage assessments** initiated for houses, roads, and public infrastructure.
- The tourism department appealed to visitors from outside the state to avoid travelling to Mizoram until weather conditions improve

Humanitarian Response

Sphere India, in coordination with the State IAG representative, district IAGs, and local organisations in Assam and Mizoram, is closely monitoring the evolving situation for potential support to alerts the state and national agencies. At present, the situation remains manageable at the district level, with local authorities effectively responding to immediate needs.

Assam Flood

Local authorities, volunteers, district IAGs groups and community groups continued supporting affected families through relief distribution centres. Health teams monitored vulnerable populations, especially in areas with high livestock losses. No protection concerns or camp-based humanitarian issues were reported.

Agriculture and livestock losses remain the most pressing humanitarian concern, with **401.22 hectares** of crop area submerged.

Mizoram Flood & Landslide

Civil society groups, churches, YMA branches, and community volunteers are actively supporting:

- Distribution of **dry rations, drinking water, blankets, and hygiene kits**.
- Clearing debris in local neighbourhoods.
- Providing **psychosocial support** to affected families.
- Assisting elderly and persons with disabilities in evacuation and relocation.

Emerging Needs

Emerging Needs – Assam

- **Emergency WASH support** – safe drinking water, restoration of hand pumps, sanitation facilities, hygiene kits, dignity kits.
- **Shelter assistance** – tarpaulins, sleeping mats, and emergency shelter materials for affected households.
- **Food & Nutrition Security** – additional dry ration support for isolated families.
- **Non-Food Items (NFI)** – essential household items for families who lost belongings.
- **Public Health Preparedness** – disease surveillance, medical outreach, and prevention of outbreaks.
- **Child Protection & Education** – Child Friendly Spaces (CFS), psychosocial support, solar lighting for schools.
- **Protection Services** – monitoring GBV risks, child protection concerns, family separation, trafficking risks.
- **Livelihood Recovery** – support for agriculture, fisheries, and livestock affected by floods.

Emerging Needs – Mizoram

- Safe shelter support for evacuated families from Tlabung and surrounding areas.
- Essential relief supplies, including food, safe drinking water, water filters, blankets, and hygiene kits for displaced households.
- Shelter and NFI support, including tin sheets for temporary roofing and household restoration.

Government support has addressed immediate food and basic relief needs in both Assam and Mizoram; however, significant multi-sectoral humanitarian assistance is still required. Coordinated action by government agencies, humanitarian organisations, and civil society remains essential to restore critical services, protect vulnerable groups, and enable a resilient recovery for affected communities.
